Dear All,

When I was growing up it was always the family tradition to go to the family in Wales for Good Friday. This was a some what different experience to the way things are today. In those days there had been no road improvements so the journey took us through every town along the way rather than around them as would be the case today. It was always obvious when you were approaching the border as there was a pub and a shop both having large signs saying that they were the last of their kind in England. Today that would have no significance (except during the pandemic) but in those days it meant things were about to change. Whilst there were only limited places open in England, and indeed the pubs had restricted opening hours – especially so on a Good Friday – everything was closed in Wales. It really did give everything a different feeling.

There was an exception in Newtown though which meant that we had to be there for 1100. The local chip shop was open was open for an hour from 1100 to 1200. I can't remember if the food was any good but it did feel special as when you looked down into the town centre no-one was about as everything else was closed. The thing I do remember very clearly was that they had Corona pop. This was always some what of a luxury as we did not have fizzy drinks at home, so having a bottle of pop together with some chips really was at the top of my childhood expectations. I always remember that it was always sunny but given that it was mid Wales I'm convinced that my memory is playing tricks on me. It's a way of life that is now long gone.

As with all things, the old ways have died to be replaced by new and different ways of being. It's the same as the central part of our faith that we celebrate at Easter. As followers of Christ we are aware that when the old ways have gone, things are resurrected in a new form. In Christ we know that gives us life in its fullest and also opens the doors to eternal life. And I know that that's far better than a bottle of Corona pop!

PC Edmunds was very impressed by our existing VAS as it recorded exactly the same speed as his speed gun and commented that he believed that it was "a major contributor in reducing the overall speeding through the village" and was the "most advanced he had seen".

PC Edmunds and his colleagues have agreed to attend the Annual Parish Meeting to answer any questions you may have.

Also, on the agenda will be a review of our activities over the past year and if you can stand all this excitement there will, of course, be the usual "refreshments".



Our speaker for our March 1st meeting was Simon Gulliver who gave us a talk entitled 'All Year Round Fruit and Veg'. He showed us how to grow all kinds of produce in a relatively small space, and how to store or preserve them for future consumption as well as giving us information on soil preparation and timings for sowing and harvesting.

The April meeting will be our Annual Bulb Show. Members bring along three cut blooms each of as many daffodil varieties as

they can muster, and everyone judges each entry to decide the winner in each class. Lots of help is available for anyone not sure of which Class to enter. <u>Make sure that you bring your own vases</u>. More than one entry can be made in each Class, except for Class 8.

- Class 1 Planted container of bulbs, any variety or varieties
- Class 2 3 cut flowers Trumpet Daffodil or Large Cupped Daffodil
- Class 3 3 cut flowers Small Cupped Daffodil or Poeticus Daffodil
- Class 4 3 cut flowers Double Daffodil
- Class 5 3 cut flowers Jonquil Daffodil, Tazetta Daffodil, or Triandrus Daffodil
- Class 6 3 cut flowers Cyclamineus Daffodil or Dwarf Daffodil
- Class 7 A Spring arrangement including at least one bulbous variety
- Class 8 Photograph (maximum size A5) depicting 'A Specimen Flower or Plant'. One entry per member for this Class.
- Class 9 3 cut flowers of bulbs, any variety of varieties

Note that there is no monthly competition at the April meeting, but the overall 1st, 2nd and 3rd scores from the Bulb Show will count towards the totals.

It has become a tradition that we each bring along a few nibbles to share, so please feel free to do so !


PLANT SALE AT BRADLEY GREEN VILLAGE HALL, CHURCH ROAD

A thank you to Breakaway

The Breakaway group have been in the Stock & Bradley community since 15th January 1980, the idea was for Ladies in the local villages, who may be isolated to meet up once a month to socialize and share the company of other Ladies, hearing various talks, and enjoy visits out. In the early years children would also accompany their mothers. Madeline Sidaway was one of the original members, and is the current Treasurer, Caroline Garvey, Hilda Johnson, Diane Baggott and Eileen West were part of the original group.

Starting the group with Jumble sales to get funds and encouraging other likeminded ladies to join, they called the group Breakaway to get away from rules and formalities of other groups, there are none of these, no membership, just come to the Village Hall the first Wednesday every month apart from January and August and pay $\pounds 5$, which includes refreshments and a chance of a raffle prize. Breakaway has two visits a year in June and October, visiting places such as Highgrove and the royal mint, three lunches in July, Christmas time and in the Spring .(originally lunches were in people's homes as there was no kitchen in the Hall) over the years Breakaway has raised money for charities such as Breast Cancer, the Air ambulance, British heart foundation and Guide doas for the blind, to name but a few, with donations to various charities standing at approx.30K over the 39 years, the local church has benefited from Breakaways generosity, purchasing curtains and supporting the Kitchen/lavatory projects. The village Hall is grateful for the tables and chairs which were purchased, along with help for a new boiler and water heater, the Breakaway Flag is flown at meetings, and again this helps with the Village Hall coffers, donations are also received by the local Chronicle.

The current President is Rita Tolley, and secretary is Margaret Hay, and now have 50 regular attendees, Breakaway welcomes new ladies to come to the meetings. I'm quite sure you would receive a warm greeting.

Rita welcomed everyone and thanked those who had supplied us with good quality raffle prizes .


We all tried the quiz which gave clues to the names of biscuits and sweets. The winner got 19/20.

A Trip to Bruges by Stella Wallis

Early February, I was treated by my daughter & son to a trip to Bruges for my 80th birthday. Sarah, my daughter organised the trip accompanied by my 2 granddaughters, Alice & Grace.

Alice was in charge of the places to see and Grace where we would eat..

We travelled by Eurostar from St Pancras station, just after 9am and reached Brussels via Lille, in just under 2 hours. (our train journey from Pershore the night before, took us a similar time) A local train took an hour to reach Bruges, where we set out to find our hotel. Problem was that the hotel was closed for refurbishment, and following phone call, we were up graded to a 4 star hotel Dukes Arches a bit further down the cobbled road. No problem!

After settling in, we took a walk around the old town, added to the Unesco World Heritage List in 2000. passed all the chocolate shops, to the main square and had some lunch, before taking a boat trip on the canals that wind their way around the town which enabled us to see many of the fine houses along the canal. Bruges once navigated by ships probably Vikings, had access to the sea, but now silted up, and is known as the Venice of the North. 5 families allowed to man the tourist boats.

Opposite our hotel was an Italian restaurant where we had our meal at night. Pizza and spaghetti all cooked on the spot.

The next morning, we had breakfast in a health food restaurant, and then set out to see the sights.

Most of the medieval city remains unchanged since the 16th century.

The legend of the Lake of Love with its swans is that in 1488 people of Bruges executed one of the town's administrators belonging to the Court of Maximillian of Austria who punished Bruges by obliging them to keep swans on their lakes and canals eternally.

We visited the Church of our Lady Bruges. The Basilica of the Holy Blood built in the 12th century with amazing decoration inside. Daffodils were out in sheltered spots even though there had been a severe frost, but the sun was out and perfect blue sky.

13th Century Belfry of Bruges 83 metres high, with a full time Carillonieur, surrounded by a large courtyard, the building apparently had been a factory but looked a bit like a workhouse or monastery. We enjoyed the ringing of the bells which was a bonus. Burg square which housed the decorated Gothic town hall dated from the 1376, held the Wednesday market, with fruit and vegetables, flowers, cheese and meat, beautifully displayed.

Tranquil garden convent of the Order of St Benedict surrounding a chapel, and with whitewashed nuns houses endowed by Joanna, Countess of Constantinople. The girls decided they must try the warm Belgium waffles with strawberries and chocolate.

Dinner at the Italian restaurant opposite as we had walked miles during the day. On our final morning, we took a walk along the outer canals which had windmills, along the bank, , before which they said I must try a waffle. I had cherries and chocolate on top which I found a bit too sweet, but couldn't leave without eating one.

Off to Bruges station for our return, and then via Eurostar to London. You could have a trip to the coast from Bruges, if you had more time.

We managed to pack in as many of the sights as possible, in the couple of days there. enjoying good weather, food and company.

Rush H Farm

A routine is forming for us here. Wednesday is 'farm team' meeting day, and that sets the tone for the next seven days – and makes sure we have a list of the jobs and their allocation! A farm diary sits in the kitchen to help us recall the day's events.

On Tuesday last, a chilly but bright day after light overnight rain, we were visited by friends of the farm Caroline from Worcester Wildlife Trust, and local farmer Jonathan, to help us make sense of the new Environmental Land Management scheme from DEFRA. But at the same time, we fairly put the world to rights regarding the production of food, and the implications of trends including rewilding, and 'meatless meat'!

This week has so far been very different weather - cold and fine drizzle, but little rain. The animals are well. The 10 or so calves from this autumn's calving look as charming and appealing as they always do. Now tall enough to feed through the 'tombstone' feed fence, copying mum, they munch on the hay, nosing through it to reach the best bits, which always seem to be buried! Sunday morning was bright and sunny, but the wind is bitter. Although it is blowing straight at their faces, it doesn't seem to put the cows off, who line up along the feeder for breakfast. Tombstone feed fences are designed for horned cattle to reduce the risk of trapped heads, essential then for our horned Traditional Herefords.

The alder trees along the brook are bursting with their spring display of catkins and seeds, and the blackthorn buds won't be long before they too burst into their white blossom. A recent trip to Worcester city allowed us to enjoy the blackthorn already blossoming – a reminder of how cold it can be here in comparison. The Apricot is looking at its very best.

The scrape already has a Canadian goose on its nest, and a heron flies away as we approach. A number of small birds take off from the long grass along the edge. Could they be Snipe? Once home, the books come out, but we are still not sure.

This week we attended an event at Smites Farm, the centre for the Worcestershire Wildlife Trust, arranged to introduce to farmers in this area to the concept of 'farm clusters' - aroups of farms coming together to facilitate the work of making environmental improvements i.e., making rivers wigaly again, and recreation of flood plains, reed beds 'to catch' phosphates and more in run-off from conventionally farmed agricultural land, and more revolutionary - trading in carbon! The other speaker expressed his concern that the true and original purpose of farming - the growing of food- not be forgotten. Both thought and discussion provoking talks.

News that February was the driest for 30 years focusses our concerns yet again on the unseasonal and extremes our weather delivers now. The dawn chorus this morning was the best for months, and the Geese are once again flying past us. We hope that the cold air forecast for next week doesn't disrupt nature's desire for spring to be sprung too much. For us too of course!





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
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
