# Church Services at Bradley Green

Dear All,

Have you ever thought that some of the things we do as the church might be completely baffling to outsiders? The

thing is, we have all grown up with them and they have become familiar but to others it can be a bit like watching a foreign language film without subtitles. As I write this in Holy Week we are just about to relive the Easter story and tomorrow will have Maundy Thursday. In many places the tradition is for the priest to wash people's feet. We all know it comes from the story in the Bible where Jesus washes his disciples feet. However, if you were unaware of this and had gone to church for the first time it might all seem a bit baffling.

Likewise, in May we will be celebrating Rogation. At this time we go out from our church buildings and pray for different parts of the community and the farming activities "in situ". This is undoubtedly a good thing to do and there's no reason why we shouldn't do this at any time during the year. However, traditionally, in the days before maps, it would be used as a way of communicating to people where the parish boundaries lay. This would often take the form of bouncing a young child on the ground in the belief that this would help them remember better – there is documentary evidence from 17<sup>th</sup> century Norfolk that this was the accepted way of doing things. In all reality it happened in most places so it wasn't just confined to East Anglia. As you will be aware, parish boundaries often follow watercourses such as streams so it was also part of the process to go into the middle of the stream. Fortunately we don't do this quite like this anymore but Rogation is still an opportunity to pray in the middle of God's creation – I think that that is a wonderful thing to do.

And when you think about it, we are creating the traditions of tomorrow by what we are doing today. A church I was on placement at many years ago had the tradition of people entering church and bowing to the empty wall opposite. It didn't make a lot of sense until you realised that for a long time there had been a statue of Jesus with Mary in that location but it was now absent – however, the tradition continued. But all these things are part of what gives us a rich tradition. They are ways that each generation has sought to live out the Christian life in ways that have spoken to them at that time, and they have all become part of our story as the Church. We need to tell the story of Jesus in whatever way works for our current times. Provided we do this with joy, compassion, freedom and love, it will become the thing that future Christians remember about us. And we can all say "Amen" to that.



# Annual Parish Meeting Report

## Wednesday 12th April, Village Hall

Over 30 residents attended to hear a review of Village activities over the past year which included reports from:

- The Parish Council Vice Chair Cllr Paul Langham.
- The Village Hall Committee Chair Roger Pask.
- Cllr Nikki Davies reconfirmed as the Village Hall representative.
- Stock & Bradley Relief in Need Charity Mrs Gloria Forgaard.
- The Footpath Warden Mrs Margaret Fish, who announced that she was retiring; the Parish Council and the Community thanked her for her devotion and hard work over the years and presented her with a bouquet of flowers and a "thank-you-card". Mrs Fish added that Mr Shaun Tame was willing to take over as Footpath Warden for which he was thanked.
- Mr Chris Cooke was also introduced as the new S&B Lengthsman.

PC Chair Cllr Mr Mike Hadley also expressed grateful thanks to Cllrs Mrs Stella Wallis and Mr Mel Bates who were retiring after many years' service on the Parish Council and presented them with gifts and "thank-you" cards.

We were also very pleased that Paul Middlebrough, Deputy Police & Crime Commissioner, West Mercia, was able to attend, this was a valuable opportunity to hear his views and plans regarding policing in West Mercia and to discuss any issues the residents wished to raise. Paul is already helping us to resolve the speeding in the village firstly by fixing the OP-SNAP signs to use with your dashcams, and asking the Safer Road Partnership to be involved, who have suggested some solutions which we are exploring. Paul stated that 2,500 additional police officers had been recruited in the last 2 years, he also suggested that if any residents had any policing issues there is a central number of 0300 123 2040 where all issues can be recorded and passed to the proper section.

We are pleased to announce that the Parish Council are planning to buy a 4<sup>th</sup> Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS), we will now have one at all the 4 entrances to Stock & Bradley, no other village in Worcestershire (and possibly England) will have this many VAS's.

# Village Hall Matters

We made our annual report for the Village Hall to an open meeting—the Annual Parish Meeting—on 12th April and again at the Village Hall AGM on 21st April. However, we are aware that many would have not been able to attend and for that reason we have made it accessible on the Village Hall web-site and summarized it below.

The report highlights the changes made during the year to enhance visibility and improve visual to make it more attractive to passing traffic. (Replacement of hedge with new fencing; new signage; freshened paintwork). A baby-changing station was added and new curtains fitted.

The most important change came with the new on-line presence—a new web-site and a Facebook page, both of which require continued promotion to would-be users. Ticket sales have moved on-line as has the hall booking system and more information about what's on is available. But we have redeveloped & maintained the Chronicle content to enable those with no electronic access to engage as previously.

A computerised book-keeping system has been introduced to ease the process and enhance accuracy of financial management.

Meanwhile the maintenance jobs keep coming! There's always something that needs doing. And while inflation has played havoc with energy costs etc., the worry remains- the big repair bill around the corner. Let alone the costs of major improvements.

With new events such as Village Hall Natters and Wreath Making and with reinstatement of the Annual Quiz and 100 Club Summer event, the use of the hall has increased as has external hire.

The 100 Club provided £1050 towards our end of year surplus and is an important source of revenue. Please support it in 2023.

In 2022 we had an income of £21,395 & spent £17,417 leaving a surplus of £3,978, of which a Covid grant was £2,667. Our surplus, net of grant, was therefore £1,311. Our end of year Bank balance was £30,607.

# STOCK AND BRADLEY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN FOR THE YEAR 2022/2023

#### Proposed Solar Farm

The parish council spent a lot of their time this year in investigating this proposal and seeking our parishioner's views. The actual planning application has now been submitted and the parish council have submitted their response which, in keeping with the overwhelming majority of our resident is to object to it. The decision, by Wychavon District Council, is not expected soon.

#### Speeding:

Speeding vehicles are: probably the one biggest cause of concern to our parishioners and I understand that this concern is common to most villages in the area. The Parish Council has purchased three state of the art VAS machines two for Church Road, Bradley Green and the other on Earls Common Road, Stock Green. These are turned to face the incoming traffic as they enter the 30-mph zone. We are pleased to announce that the Parish Council have budgeted for a 4th Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS), we will now have one at all the 4 entrances to Stock & Bradley, no other village in Worcestershire (and possibly England) will have this many VAS's.

The PC have also convened a mtg to discuss possible solutions to the concerns expressed by the residents of Stock & Bradley to the Parish Council, regarding the excessive speeding through our village which has progressively increased over the past years.

The Parish Councillors felt the meeting was productive with positive support from all attending and a plan for future actions was agreed, they thanked Paul Middlebrough for his support in facilitating and managing the meeting.

We have applied to the Safer Roads Partnership for permission to carry out our own speed enforcement, but it is a very lengthy process and despite chasing it up we still await their decision. The Parish Councillors would also like to thank PC's Edmunds and PCSO Vicky Elliot for making Stock & Bradley a regular stop for village speed checks.

**Queen's 70th Jubilee celebrations** –a beacon was lit on the hill behind Kate & Gordon Farmiloe on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> June at 9.45, over 100 residents attended.

A celebration was held in the village hall from 3pm to 5 pm on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June with the PC providing sandwiches, cakes, tea and a glass of fizz - all residents were invited. There was evening celebration also on the 4<sup>th</sup> of June with entertainment, a paying bar and B-B-Q.

**Queen's Jubilee Garden at Priest Bridge**, the Jubilee Oak Tree and many daffodils have been planted to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee.

**Coronation celebration** – has been planned for the afternoon of Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> May, when all residents of S&B are invited to a complementary glass of fizz and refreshments in the village hall. CC Cllr Mr T Miller has generously donated £500 and the Clerk had also requested £200 from the WDC Coronation fund.

#### Flooding in Stock Green:

Due to the nature of the environment, there is no guaranteed way to prevent future flooding, however, the Environment Agency have cleared the Stock Green Brook and have undertaken to de-silt in future years. Chair Mike Hadley and Reg Hughes participated in a Zoom meeting with WDC planning and flood elevation officers, where these issues were discussed.

#### The Parish Council Lengthsman Scheme:

Our Lengthsman is Allen Farnsworth. The scheme has proved to be very successful, Allen has now retired, and we have signed a new contract with Mr Chris Cooke and his colleague, who services several other PCs

#### Village litter pick:

The Council organised two "litter picks" this year, many thanks to all those who took the time to support this worthwhile activity – the whole village was covered, the Parish Council now owns 20 pickers, tabards and gloves should anyone wish to start an impromptu litter pick.

#### High Speed Broadband:

The Parish Council is continuing contact with Airband to maintain the Highspeed Broadband "fibre to the door" throughout Stock and Bradley there are some issues but overall, it is proving successful with speeds more than 150 mbts.

#### New ways of sharing information in the village:

The council regularly updates its web site, notice boards and the S&B Chronicle Magazine to improve communications with the residents which contain Agendas, Minutes, Accounts of the Parish Council, and other information. Some information is also put on the local WhatsApp Group.

#### **Defibrillators:**

The two defibrillators, one sited at the Village Hall and the other in phone box in Stock Green have been regularly maintained, but not used. Two very successful Defib/CPR training sessions were held in the VH attended by over 40 residents.

#### **Councillors and Training:**

Mike Hadley was elected Chairman and Stella Wallis Vice Chair for the coming year and Councillors and the Clerk attended several County Council and Worcestershire CALC, virtual educational and awareness seminars, and meetings.

#### Accounts:

The accounts were approved by the external auditors PKF Littlejohn LLP. The Budget for 2023/24 has been approved and it was agreed to increase the Precept by 3% to £7,725.

The Parish Councillors would like to thank Mr Gordon Farmiloe for auditing the accounts.

The council is preparing for **PC elections** Thursday 4th May.

# BREAKAWAY

#### Wednesday 5th April 2023

Although the weather was dull and drizzly outside, we soon brightened up as the Village Hall was filled with people bustling about and plenty of laughter and chatter.

We had 10 guests and, hopefully, some of them will become members.

Rita welcomed everyone and informed us that the April Lunch raffle raised £137 and the overall profit was £86.02. She also thanked everyone who had donated lovely raffle prizes.

Rita then read a poem about saying goodbye to an old friend who had supported her over the years with trips to the hospital and to the airport. We were feeling quite sorry and then realised that it was her car that had failed its MOT!

Our speaker for the day was Reg Moule.


According to my iPad Reg was Pershore trained and then ran a nursery/garden centre. He is a writer in the media and spent many years as a lecturer. He is on BBC local and National radio and does a "phone in" on Radio 2. He also spent 7 years on Gardeners Diary on the TV.

Reg decided to start off by discussing peat free compost. Apparently of all the peat dug up in Ireland only 10% goes to garden compost, 90% goes to power stations. The Irish peat is pure spaghnum moss. The Balkan peat is moss mixed with sedges and other materials. The Green Party has pushed for peat free compost and all compost will be peat free by 2024.

Reg went "peat free" 2 years ago and recommended Melcourt Sylva Grow which consists of coir, green compost and composted bark. It is produced at Tetbury.

The drawbacks to peat free compost are that it dries out quickly and does not retain food. Reg therefore recommended that "little and often" works the best. Controlled release feed in granule form works well.

Reg then answered questions on tree peonies, celandines on a lawn, ivy, camellias, bay trees, cordylines and



phormiums, gunneras, houseplants and ferns.

Two highly recommended items were fleece bags - covering the plant and the pot, and the old fashioned Phostrogen feed.

After working full time in the trade for 51 years Reg moved to Rowberrys, Chaddesley Corbett in July 2016, He is there on Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays. He also runs tutorials on the first Tuesday in every month, except January.

Reg also answers questions on Radio Hereford and Worcester on Sunday afternoons from 2.00pm - 4.00pm. However he explained that this will only be until September when National Radio takes over Local Radio stations.

Reg stayed on to take more questions and Mary Waring gave the vote of thanks. She said that his talk had been educational, thought provoking and informative. She particularly enjoyed the gardening tips.

It was then time to draw the excellent raffle and make for home.

We soon discovered that David Barrie was a professional wine taster with highly developed tasting skills and in-depth knowledge and understanding of wines and other alcohol based beverages. As with so many of the speakers that make the WI a place for inspiring women, David shared the defining moments that had taken him into his specialised role. For him it began with his choice, as a school leaver, of employment in a well-known offlicence.

Wine was just rising in popularity and the company recognised the need for staff members to be well-informed. David attended courses; heard lectures from prominent speakers and took the exams and tests that followed. With opportunities to visit wine producers abroad, David refined his skills to the point where he could recognise grape variety, vintage and provenance.

His expertise led to him becoming a key figure in the company. His daily routines covered quality control of wines bottled for sale; monitoring of imported wines and involvement in research and development.

The pinnacle of his career as a wine taster came with a move to work with an independent company in Cheltenham operating as a wine buyer and broker. In this role he needed to be able to predict how a specific wine would develop in time. David spoke without notes or illustrations. His only prop was a tumbler of water for demonstrating the process of wine tasting. His enthusiastic presentation kept his audience enthralled and there were a number of questions afterwards. Who would have thought that the choice made by a sixteen year old boy would have had such an impact!

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
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
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
