The Rangers are calling for help with tree planting in the Country Park to replace the 360 larch which were felled in 2013 due to Phytophthora ramorum. Last year 1,000 mainly hazel whips were planted.

This year, thanks to funding and volunteers from Deutsche Bank, a further 3,000 will be planted. These will be done in two all day sessions starting from 10am on Thursday 29 January and Thursday 12 March 2015.

Lickey Hills Society 30th Birthday

Originally formed as a result of local opposition to a proposed ski slope on Rednal Hill, the society celebrated 30 years of activity at its AGM in November. Since then, the registered charity has worked tirelessly to promote and conserve the area by organising practical activities, meetings, publishing three booklets, funding improvements and leading walks.

The AGM was hosted by the Ranger Service at the Lickey Hills Country Park Visitor Centre. Amongst those invited were former park rangers, committee members who had moved out of the area, and other 'friends groups' – in all more than seve

Perhaps most heartening was an impromptu thanks to the Society made by Geoff Coles, who had originally been on the "opposite side" as a Birmingham Council employee and part of the team proposing the ski slope back in 1984. The evening was rounded off by a very entertaining and upbeat talk on the trials and tribulations of the Lickey Hills Country Park by Steve Hinton, Senior Ranger.

As reported in the Chairman's welcome, we have ordered a speed indicator sign which displays the actual speed of passing vehicles – we hope this will be effective as we will rotate it to various sites throughout the Parish.

We would like a permanent sign on Old Birmingham Road, approaching the junction at Tesco, where our mobile unit is attracting in excess of 1,000 hits each day – that is 1,000 vehicles each day exceeding the speed limit. We need the permission of Worcestershire County Council to install this and await their decision.

We have been really fortunate to secure the services of Fred and Jim who work in the County Highways department and are available to undertake work, which is free of charge, in parishes.

WADDERTON 37 Greenhill, Blackwell — in danger

"Attractive Victorian property set within stunning surroundings in the popular village of Blackwell. The property comprises a former conference centre together with a range of outbuildings set within 12 acres of picturesque grounds. It has not been occupied for some time and therefore the grounds and buildings are in need of restoration and maintenance."

This was the estate agent's description of Wadderton when it was on the market for £950,000 earlier this year. The parish council agrees that this important Victorian family home does need restoration and maintenance. We would like to see it preserved as an important local heritage asset.

The present owner has apparently no intention of restoring and living in his new property, and has announced his intention to demolish on Saturday 20 December. We are grateful to THE VILLAGE magazine for drawing this to everyone's attention. It has already been flagged up on our parish facebook page www.facebook.com/ lickeyandblackwellcouncil.

Why are we so concerned about this property?

In addition to its links with 19th century industrial Birmingham, the 12 acre site has a badger sett, bats in the house and is visited by roe deer, muntjac, foxes and all manner of smaller animals and birds. We are informed by PC

Simon Albutt that it is illegal to destroy a sett without providing alternative accommodation. If only humans were so well protected! There is also a model farm to the rear of the site.

Wadderton's Provenance

Wadderton at 37 Greenhill was built in 1870 and is a good example of Victorian domestic architecture. It has an important provenance as the family home of the Mitchells, one of the world famous group of pen makers at a time when Birmingham's pen nib industry was the largest in the world. The Mitchells knew and associated with fellow pen manufacturers, the Gillotts and the Brandauers, and it was the Mitchells who invented a method for

the mass production of pen nibs. They are featured in the Birmingham Pen Museum and were the subject of a display at the old Birmingham library just before it closed.

As well as the Mitchells, Wadderton was the family home of the Greys whose department store in Bull Street was of significance in Birmingham's commercial development in the last century. It then became the retreat house and study centre of Worcester Anglican Diocese and has a chapel dedicated to St Francis. Latterly it was the Midlands training centre of the Children's Society.



Bought by a group of businessmen and rebranded Remax (Blackwell) it stood empty, became a cannabis farm, was closed by the police, and when the company was wound up bought by the present owner, who plans to have it demolished.

Potential Conservation Area

Wadderton has a whole chapter in local historian Jennie McGregor-Smith's publication VICTORIAN GREENHILL which records how the rich industrial families of Birmingham arrived in our village when the newly built railway was able to take them to their places of work in Birmingham. These families included the Cadburys at Rosemary Cottage and Cropwood and the Oslers (glass) at Burcot Grange.

We fear demolition of one of these houses could open the way for others to be lost. Featuring in the our VILLAGE DESIGN STATEMENT, we recommended the preservation of such properties.

Wadderton, 3 December 2014

The threatened demolition has renewed efforts to make Greenhill part of a Conservation Area and local councillors are working with Mary Worsfold, Conservation Officer, at Bromsgrove District Council to progress this. We are also in the process of writing a list of buildings for local listing.

A petition to save the house can be signed at Blackwell Village Stores - it would clearly demonstrate to both the district planning officers and the owner how much we value our village heritage assets if a large number of signatures are collected.

Update from Network Rail

As most residents will be aware, there are various works being undertaken on our local railway lines.

Work is progressing on the construction of a new station at Bromsgrove with land clearance and decontamination underway as it's being built on the old oil depot. Track relocation will create space for four platforms, lifts and a 350-space car park. The station will be served by Cross-City Line services between Bromsgrove, Birmingham New St and Lichfield, with an extra three trains per hour each way on weekdays transforming future rail travel locally.

To support this, a new phase of engineering work is about to commence to electrify the line between Barnt Green and Bromsgrove. This necessitates the reconstruction of four bridges locally, to provide enough room for the overhead wires. Barnt Green station footbridge will be replaced with a new steel bridge and there will be new bridges at the end of Linthurst Newtown and off Blackwell Road (which serves a residential property). The works will lead to the following road closures during 2015:

Hewell Lane (Barnt Green) 10 Jan - 20 Apr

Linthurst Newtown 10 Jan - 30 Mar

Blackwell Rd (closed near M42 bridge) 30 Mar - 27 Apr

Next October the line between Barnt Green and Bromsgrove will shut completely for 12 days, with train diversions and replacement bus services in place. This will enable the old Bromsgrove station to be demolished, a new track laid, electrification and full re-signalling.



Inevitably, there will be some noisy construction work at times, including night-time working, but the contractors will try to minimise both the duration and noise where possible. Network Rail will communicate more about this to lineside neighbours during the course of construction.

The new Linthurst Newtown bridge will have two lanes and a narrow footway. Whilst one metre higher, the slope will be more gradual than at present. Good news for very unfit cyclists! The footpath across the rail line to the golf club will be closed and a pedestrian footbridge provided. Your comments on this would be welcome.

The work being carried out to our local railway represents the biggest investment in transport in the Bromsgrove area since the M42 motorway was built offering a modern railway station at Bromsgrove with additional and more frequent services to central Birmingham and locations beyond.
