



# Q1: How many people live in your household in each of the following age groups?






### Q3: Is there a car available to your household?





In the chart below, the number of answers to each question is shown:










# Q6: Is it important to your household to have a public meeting place in Suckley for indoor sports, village events and meetings?







# Q11: Do you think more housing is required in Suckley and, if so, what type?





## Q13: Where do you do most of your weekly shopping?









# Q17: Should money be provided from your Parish Council tax to assist, improve or develop these facilities/services?





Q18: If yes to Q17, please identify your top three items





## Q19: Do you use public footpaths or bridleways in Suckley?











**Q25:** Do you think speed limits on roads throughout Suckley are appropriate?





**Q26:** Would you support 30mph zones being reduced to a 20mph speed limit?





# Q29: Is there anything else which you feel would make Suckley a better place to live in?


- Being able to use village hall. Not everyone wants to have meetings in church. I suppose Hop Shed will take that over for anyone uncomfortable with church.
- I think Suckley could be made prettier by gated access on main roads (side white fencing) to slow folks down. Flowers stop some litterers. Lovely welcome to Suckley signs and asking not to drop litter would add pride.
- Need more affordable houses or Suckley will become old people's home, with most houses having extensions nobody can afford them.

- Entrance to village could be improved
- Community hub. Pub was ideal when open as was epicentre. More advertising about local events, especially on social media.
- Make over the playing fields. Very out of date play equipment. Gated park. Kompan equipment is really good. No grass under equipment gets very muddy and slippery.
- Include more in-depth information in future Suckley newsletter
- Growing concerns that Suckley has been categorised as a category 1 settlement when it
  doesn't come close to meeting their criteria set out for this. There are fears amongst
  residents that actively used agricultural landfill will be turned into housing developments,
  therefore opening the doors to changing Suckley's landscape and preserving the village.
   When it has been a challenge to have certain aspects of a small extension passed let alone
  new houses.
- A community shop like Alfrick
- Suckley's key assets are the school and church, and the link between them. Hence the focus on this in this survey.
- Farmers should clean the mud off the roads more often as its their tractors that churn it up from verges. We should be allowed a convex safety mirror at the junction of the Knowl and Knightwick Road to see traffic coming from the village direction.
- Explanation for answer to housing question (11) there is currently a lack of facilities with
  the village (mains drainage, school is at capacity, infrastructure stretched generally), with
  this potentially going to get worse (Nelson PH currently closed, shop/PO likely to close, bus
  services under threat); until these issues are addressed and improved we lack the ability to
  absorb new housing.
- I myself would not use it at present, but a community taxi service would be very beneficial. There are many elderly drivers in the area who struggle on the narrow lanes and passing farm vehicles or commercial lorries. I don't think driving slower helps. Of course high speeds are dangerous.
- 30mph from main road, A44 through village with speed cameras in place permanently.
- It is such a shame we are about to lose our only shop and post office. This village has lost too much. Bring back a fete, bring & buy sales, etc to try and get the community being one again.
- Revive The Nelson and protect the PO and shop.
- Perhaps consider CCTV in playing fields to promote safety fears.
- Extensive comments provided. Refer to survey form.
- Better road drainage and maintenance. Lower Parish precept.
- Speed limits, enforcement not carried out. At this time, signs, etc, do nothing. Limit access to HGVs, farm vehicle speeds.
- Restrict access/parking of heavy lorries, roads unsuitable
- For the Nelson pub to re-open.
- Village shop top keep open
- Find Suckley a thoroughly enjoyable and sociable place to live in particular meeting people at The Cross Keys, Hop Shed, Suckley Church, BFG, Wombling, tractor rally and much walking in our beautiful area. Personally plenty going on for our age group not sure re older/younger people whose needs are much more important than ours.
- 1) Cars are too big and drive too fast for lanes designed for narrower and slower vehicles. Have need for compulsory slowing where possible. 2) Lorries along ther main road are inappropriately big. 3) Noise from compressors and Park House farm ought to be baffled.

- Stop Hop Shed brewery customers blocking the road near the Hop Shed by inconsiderate parking on Friday evenings. Keep hedges off the roads. Regularly unblock road drains.
- We appreciate all the efforts made to make this a lovely community to live in thank you Parish Councillors for all your work. All these positive ideas are most welcome. We will be pleased to help in the future when we retire.
- Enforced hedge and tree clearance from side of carriageways.
- Extensive comments provided. Refer to survey form.
- The local public house The Nelson re-opened to form a focal point for the village.
- The village needs the Post Office/Shop to stay open. The pub is sorely missed as it was a hub for the village and it would bt good to see it re-opened.
- Since we moved here we have got involved in a lot of social groups, but not in Suckley. Many of these are based in Alfrick or in our interest groups. So we don't have a lot of time to be involved locally at the moment. So yes, it's great to have ideas of what could be done, but for us, there isn't a lot of time to get more involved on a regular basis.
- A re-opening of the village pub. The retainment of the village shop and PO.
- Mother (carer) group and babies/toddlers informal coffee-type meetings (craft, knit & chatter).
- Community spirit in Suckley is in deep decline hence Nelson is shut. Post office and shop are closing. Day to day community resources are not valued enough by the local community.
- If money is available, could the 4 white posts in the Quarry be replaced by stones. They wouldn't need to be from Holloways, but similar stones that look better would be nice and more appropriate. (Just replica ones, not antique ones).
- Most information is only posted on Facebook, not everyone has access to Facebook. If future
  events are being promoted other means of communications need to be considered, eg.
  Sphere, local notice boards.
- I think the park needs an upgrade, we always visit in the summer. Would be great to have better equipment, a bike track or something for the older kids.
- A village pub serving food would be welcome.
- I have lived here for 30+ years. Since the pub and village have closed (eg. last 3 years) I don't feel I see people like I used to. We met neighbours from other areas of the village. No sense of community any more.
- Village pub and restaurant. Why is the Nelson not open?
- A central meeting area
- There seems to be so much in Suckley geared to the needs and entertainment of children and young people, especially church related, and not for adult/older residents, which discourages a large chunk of the population of the Suckley area.
- Massive shame that The Nelson pub has closed. This is a huge loss to the local community and is in an area that enabled people to meet socially and get to know one another. Longley Green shop and post office would be more accessible if the hours were more varied. As working people it's really difficult to use this great facility as they close at 4pm so earlier than we could get there. Obviously, no one wants to overload the staff there, but would slightly varied opening hours enable more trade and more people to use the facilities? We would love to patronise the shop/post office more. During lockdown, this was a wonderful resource and it's such a shame to not be able to access this.
- The Nelson Inn formed an important social meeting place for many locals as well as cyclists, walkers and visitors especially when good pub grub, Sunday roasts were available. Suckley would be a better place if The Nelson was brought back to its former glory so that we had

somewhere to meet friends, enjoy good food and drink. Suckley post office and shop is an essential service to Suckley residents and the wider local community, it should not be allowed to close or be converted into residential premises only. The present owners provided an invaluable service to residents during the Covid lockdown and restrictions. However, it now seems they have lost all motivation and willingness to provide a local service that meets the needs of the area. They are quick to complain about lack of support but they do very little to ensure footfall or support from passing traffic. The shop opening hours are not sufficient as they are – they need to be open from at least 8am to catch people going to work and school. They also need to be open past 4pm so that people travelling home from work or in need of supplies can call in for essentials. Saturday opening from 9-10am is of no use to anyone! Instead of complaining about lack of footfall, maybe they should be proactive and provide a service that meets the needs of the area and its residents. If the present owners are not happy with the business they decided to take on maybe they should sell up and give someone else a chance to work at it. People will only use a shop if they can depend on it being open and that stock is varied, useful and at a competitive price. Maybe the Parish Council could offer financial support or a community scheme to ensure the shop stays open.


