I've been reading 1 and 2 Samuel this week, partly to remind myself about the story but mostly because I feel that I need to preach on the Old Testament more. I've thought this for a while, but it now seems like it's time to put my money where my mouth is. Samuel's two books are in the lectionary – the shared list of weekly readings that many denominations of church use – for the next month or so, so is a good time to revisit.

We shy away from the Old Testament, or more correctly, from the Hebrew Scriptures ('Old Testament' implying that its discardable, or has been superseded now that we have a 'New Testament'), because it's unfamiliar and so takes more effort; people, places, mindsets and the overall direction of travel are less familiar than the New Testament. We all know, however roughly, the shape of the New Testament story, from Christmas to Easter, birth to death and resurrection, and we know, however vaguely, some of the names – Paul, Peter, Andrew, Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, Judas, Mary, the other Mary, etc. They feel more comfortable, and more familiar that Nahash the Ammonite, for instance, or Ahijah, son of Ahitub.

But I keep coming back to the feeling that in not reading the Hebrew Bible, we move away from Jesus, because those are the writings that he based his faith on. Matthew 5:17 sees Jesus saying, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them.' So, he is inserting his ministry into the context of the Hebrew Scriptures, drawing on them for the new things that he had to say.

Martin Hengel, a New Testament scholar, once said that 'if all you know is the New Testament, then you don't know the New Testament.' And although my Jewish friends would question it when Christians say that certain episodes in the Hebrew Scriptures 'mean' Jesus (look at Hosea 6: 1-4 for what they regard as some prime Christian 'reverse engineering'), it's good to acknowledge the shared heritage, the common conversation that the Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament share.

Read Samuel!



Becky, the caretaker agreed, to put the central heating on early so that the room would be warm up to 9.00am and then the residual heat would do the rest.



# Rush Farm

A second early morning visit from Gert to study our bird life was organised after the early May morning's first visit was too cold for much to see or hear. This second time, the north wind was blowing. Hard to believe that this May and Spring were recorded as the warmest, still... this time Reed Bunting were seen nesting on the Scrape, and White Throats were spotted nesting in several sites across the farm. A Yellow Hammer was also spotted, along with an interesting grass species

In the cattle, New Forest Eye cases were becoming greater in number, but after taking homoeopathic action last week, this week, so far, all is calmer. Interestingly, we share with trepidation of the 'commentator's curse', so far cases are only in the Young Stock. Measures to separate the cases out from the herd are hampered by lack of space. We are working with Crossgates, having sent them a swab, so that we might have help with a workable solution. Use of iodine isn't appreciated as it stinas. which makes getting Euphrasia applied a challenge too. Homoeopathic remedies are currently being added to the water troughs, daily as this is an extreme case.

The cattle are due blood tests for Johnes, BVD, and to check their mineral profile for bolus treatment and licks to be placed in the fields. This work is for our own records, but also for the Premium Cattle Health Programme, we are working with. Their ambition is to eradicate Johnes and BVD from pedigree herds.

The sheep have been put through a footbath, and lameness has lessened. Our theory is the muddy pastures were getting in their hooves. Hopefully now resolved. The lambs were weighed and the averages cheering. Last weekend Alice completed her sheep shearing course and came back with resplendent bruises on both legs from the sheer physicality of the work. This weekend, with the days warm enough, she will begin to tackle the flock here.

Hemlock is making a late appearance, but with the ground soft, is easily pulled. Some of the fields were dry enough for rolling to take place, and in other fields still drying out, the ruts were driven over to flatten them out. If the drier weather holds we will be able to complete the emptying of the barn, and muck spreading on the fields now accessible to the large machinery.

Rush Farm will be attending
Groundswell this year, supporting our
fabulous landlord Stockwood
Community Benefit Society. A twoday festival where people can share
ideas, get inspiration, see the latest
technology. We will be there (stand
DFB38!) to talk about biodynamics,
community ownership, and the CBS
model as a solution to farm
succession.



#### Save the shire

Our recent guided community nature walk across The Shire was a huge success with more than 25 people taking part.

During the two-hour walk, local landscape expert Carly Tinkler highlighted some of the wildlife and flora which make this beautiful landscape so special, with the group also spotting several muntjac and roe deer.

"Along the way, to the sound of skylark warbling high above, we passed Dormston Manor, aka Tolkien's Bag End, where his aunt lived", added Carly.

"We peered into the ancient woodland at Roundhill Wood, with majestic oak and ash giving us shelter during a rainstorm, hazel coppice, used for sticks and posts, as it was in medieval times and wild garlic and bluebells, which are ancient woodland indicators.

"We walked back through lush wildflower meadows, brimming with pollinators enjoying the diverse native flora, including purple vetch, bird's foot trefoil, yellow rattle, knapweed, creeping buttercup, meadow cranesbill, lady's bedstraw, and oxeye daisy."

Everyone who attended was given a special commemorative badge.

#### Kington with Dormston WI

June 2024 - Hearing Dogs for Deaf People

Merleen Watson set a powerful example for the importance of communication. She used technology to ensure that her audience could hear! Merleen has been profoundly deaf since her thirties and is reliant on powerful hearing aids.

There was something for everyone in her presentation.

One in five people have some form of hearing loss and age can increase the problem. Merleen stressed the importance of seeking help at an early stage. Hearing loss can reduce social contact leading to depression. She explained how to arrange for testing and access to audiologists.

She gave examples of ways in which we can all be more mindful of people with hearing loss. She spoke of strategies and equipment to improve every-day life such as enjoying TV programmes; ways to socialise with friends; and the importance of good planning and use of technology to make public meetings inclusive.

Merleen and her husband, Paul, work hard to raise awareness of living with hearing loss. They volunteer for several hearing loss related organisations. A current project is the exciting work currently taking place in Worcestershire hospitals to make suitable provision for those with hearing loss.

They are also enthusiastic advocates for hearing dogs. Their current dog, Zyla, gave a strong demonstration of the various ways in which she could alert Merleen to sound. Just that morning she had notified Merleen of a fire alarm. Following her presentation, Merleen made herself available to provide information sheets and to talk with individual members.

The new afternoon meeting time allowed more members to attend and there was a relaxed atmosphere when those present could enjoy extended social time and tempting refreshments.
