



TBC bid for Garden Town status

- In November 2018 TBC submitted a bid for Garden Town Status at Ashchurch. The bid built on the Concept Masterplan for the area
- March 2019 TBC heard the bid had been successful and awarded status along with £750,000 capacity funding






What benefits does Garden Town status bring?

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Clear identity – a distinctive local identity with functioning centre and public realm.





Well-designed places – vibrant mixed use communities that support a range of local employment types and premises, retail opportunities, recreational and community facilities.



Great homes – range of high quality, distinctive homes. This includes affordable housing and a mix of tenures for all stages of life.





Strong local vision and engagement with community – designed and executed with the engagement and involvement of the existing local community, and future residents and businesses.



Transport – integrated, forward looking and accessible transport options that support economic prosperity and wellbeing for residents.



Healthy places – providing choices and chances for all to live a healthy life



Green space – generous, accessible, and good quality environmental infrastructure that promotes health, wellbeing, and quality of life.





Legacy and stewardship arrangements – for the care of community assets, infrastructure and public realm, for the benefit of the whole community.



Future proofed – designed to be resilient places that allow for changing demographics, future growth and the impacts of climate change.

Community Engagement

- Masterplan consultation work with Thinking Place started this process
- Formal engagement structure with communities /parishes – what should this look like?

- Phase 1 development master planner commissioned to bring this forward (northern area)
- Infrastructure analysis including offline A46 and wider flood/environmental assessment
- Engaging with key agencies
