Consecration of the New Cemetery at Pear Tree Fields

An event of truly momentous significance in the history of our community took place on 23 November, when the Right Reverend Robert Paterson conducted a service of consecration at our new cemetery at Pear Tree Fields. He was assisted by Rev. Fr. Philip Morton and an invited congregation of County and District Councillors, Parish Councillors, a local grave digger and monumental stone mason, West Mercia Police and residents representing groups within our community, as well as Wychavon staff who are closely involved with the project.







This will provide burial space for many years to come within our community and avoid the prospect of burials and interments of ashes having to be in Evesham and at a much higher cost. Bishop Robert conducted a moving yet friendly service which left all present feeling they had been part of something unique in most of our lifetimes.

Photographs and video were taken of the event which will be shared with residents on badseypc.uk and we intend to hold a proper public opening of the site in mid-2022. Residents wishing to access the site before then are welcome to contact the Council.


Late January (above) and October (below)




Photographs were taken in late October by a resident using his licensed drone. As well as the newlyoccupied allotments near the North Gate car park, the fenced area of the cemetery itself and the East Gate car park are clearly visible. More recently, the access drive from the East Gate to the cemetery has been completed to a high standard by our local contractor and the ornamental gateway to the cemetery is now in place giving access to the internal pathways and central feature, soon to be planted in accordance with the design produced by Lynn Gibson. The cemetery will also be screened by the planting of hedges and the wide strips closer to the western and southern boundaries, as well as other areas, will be planted with overwhelmingly native species of trees and shrubs to create a valuable habitat for fauna and flora This process is already under way and the planting is scheduled for early December. The large areas to the east of the cemetery and allotments will be planted during the period after Christmas with areas of appropriate local fruit trees and the process of creating wild flower meadow areas will begin.

The heavy Vale of Evesham clay soil is already receiving quantities of organic material to improve the soil condition, and residents with livestock have offered assistance with this also. We wish them many years of happy growing!


Planting for the future

As well as the magnificent central feature in the heart of the cemetery itself (shown here), which was designed by Lynn Gibson and benefits from her huge expertise, our local contractor will be planting hedges as screens, along with canopy trees and smaller underplanting to make, as it matures, an area of real value to residents and wildlife alike.

Badsey WI as well as the Parish Council have requested trees from the Woodland Trust, and these and other plantings will begin in early December. We hope to enjoy financial and moral support from Natural Networks in conjunction with Worcestershire Wildlife Trust to help transform what has long been a species -poor area of grazing land into an area rich in native plants and traditional orchard species of which residents can be proud and where they will for many years to come be able to walk and enjoy something very special.

In early 2022 the planting of fruit trees, many with local connections, will be undertaken in groups, interspersed with wildflower meadowland, something which has long been very rare in our countryside.

A scheme for the maintenance for the future of the whole site will be in place, with mowings and prunings kept on site for composting as far as is possible. The large-scale composting system to be constructed in the coming months will in due course help with improvement of the soil of the allotments, too, while benefiting the wild flower plantings by giving them the less rich soils in which they thrive.
