Dear Friends,

The snowdrops are just coming out on the grass bank between the churchyard and Hanbury road. There are 6 or 7 weeks of meteorological winter until spring starts

on 1st march. The weather might have different ideas, of course.

The Christmas decs are long gone and the trees off to be chipped. But the Nativity scenes stayed up in Church until the 2nd February and the Feast of Candlemas.

Both the snowdrops and the Nativity scenes are simple signs that all is not what it seems. It's a grey windy and chilly winter's day as I write this. But beneath the surface things are stirring in the hope that the lengthening days will bring the necessary warmth and the strengthening light will work its magic and cook the seeds and soil into the amazing dish we call spring.

All around are lots of worrying news stories. Barely a fortnight old, already 2020 has brought us the reality of what climate change really means in Australia and the increasing chance of major conflict in the Persian Gulf which could, in fact, engulf us all. As I write things have quietened down between Iran and the U.S. and at the same time we look at the return of a functioning Stormont optimistically.

By the time you read this we shall have officially left the E.U. But no one knows what that will actually mean.

In the parish many people struggle with health issues and we hear bad news and some good.

The recent election should have reminded us all that politicians are just human beings with none of the magic of snowdrops. Sometimes they get it right. Often they don't. Snowdrops always get it right.

The Church, as a human institution, lurches into a new decade still split over many things, not least human sexuality.

In short, things are just as they have always been, and if we want to look for meaning (something many have given up doing) then we might need to look more at the snowdrops than at the human institutions of government or Church. Both are made up of you and me, one way or another, and we need to find our connection with the snowdrops, with the soil, with the living earth. We are made of the dust. So science tells us. So the Jewish-Christian tradition tells us too.

Hope is right here, right now. It is in silence more than noise, it is in listening rather than talking. Let that hope empower our 2020s.

MEADOW FARM NURSERY AND GARDEN, FECKENHAM

In the last issue of the Chronicle I told the story of how we built the nursery here at Meadow Farm in Feckenham and I will continue this month with the story of the garden.

Towards the end of summer 1999, we began physically setting out the garden, only to find that the reasonable soil on the northern side aradually deteriorated into awful subsoil towards the southern side. Knowing that we had such dreadful soil to improve, we had 30 trailer loads of cow manure delivered in September 1999, about 75 tons, and stacked it in the field to rot down. That would keep us busy for a bit when we came to use it. We also had 15 tons of composted waste delivered - brilliant stuff, just like peat. We would be well armed for when we had time to start creating planting beds.

From April to October we were selling at a plant sale nearly every weekend, sometimes on both Saturday and Sunday, and at Bank Holidays on the Monday, too, so creative activities were much reduced and we concentrated on growing and selling. The light evenings of course gave us the opportunity to carry on until late in the day, and we would finish each night as the rooks flew in to the nearby wood for the night.

From the beginning of 2000, we were able to concentrate more on the garden construction, and on the meadow where we planted hundreds of Snakeshead Fritillary bulbs and seed raised cowslips and primroses, and Meadow Cranesbill, all raised from the seed of local native plants.

We built an 18ft x 10ft greenhouse in the garden, built a low, curving, retaining wall on the embankment below the house, restructured the driveway to the rear of the house (more hardcore and gravel!), built a pergola for roses and clematis, laid some new timber steps, created a Hellebore bed and an alpines area, dug two ponds and reconstructed a piped land drain as a surface stream feeding the two ponds.

The following winter, we laid out a traditional long border and continued barrowing, this time manure (now well rotted), compost, and gravel all incorporated by double digging. Just one side of the border took another 89 miles of walking between us – but the improvement was worth it. Diane was also busy with paving slabs again, creating paths and sitting areas by the pond.

The next project was a lych-gate styled entrance to the garden, planting 1000 snowdrops, and a small woodland area in part of the meadow to increase the range of habitat. Further projects included a Silver Garden, a Summerhouse Garden and a Yew Courtyard

Garden. Work on the garden has continued ever since by way of maintenance and improvements and we have been having group visits to the garden almost since the beginning.

The pleasure which our garden and nursery have brought us is immeasurable and we have met so

many keen and enthusiastic gardeners at our plant sales and via our garden visitors.

Those twenty years have been a busy time and we are often asked if we would do it again. You bet we would, but now only on a much smaller scale.

Rita made several announcements namely:-


We have been discussing the March 2020 Lunch. Menus will be available in February.

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Rush Farm

A rather subdued week on the farm. A period without rain ended abruptly on Wednesday night. The farm is now wetter than we have ever experienced. The ground is so saturated the water can do no more than lie in vast puddles.

More positively, generally all seems well both with the cattle and sheep. Two weeks previously we had welcomed a new bull calf which was more than can be said for his mother who needed to be pressured to feed and care for her calf, a fact which may have implications for her future. The unwilling mother is unfortunately no more willing to accommodate her calf, but she does have milk and the calf is somehow growing. Attempts to help matters homeopathically continue.

We went south at the beginning of January to deposit Bacchus with his new owners and to collect Laxfield Piper, nicknamed Dwaine! All went very smoothly, Bacchus entered and left the trailer very calmly, and Dwaine, bribed by a handful of haylage, was happy to board the trailer, but even happier to get out as he smelt a cow bulling.

Interestingly, following an in house discussion as to whether it was worthwhile drenching the cattle for worms- something we have never done, the issue came up on the Pasture Fed site. The discussion was useful in throwing some light on why worming cattle is rarely necessary on

any farm but even less likely to be needed with cattle raised as they are here.

A different source- seemingly reputable- has come to the conclusion that cattle have friendship groups and can recognise a friend when shown photographs. Fortunately, or otherwise, this memory seems to have a limited life- absence leads to forgetfulness not a strengthening bond. Less surprisingly, cattle grow better, produce more milk and are happier when there is a strong bond with humans.

Yet another source sadly informs us we have to have a six month TB test. No date has been fixed yet but probably it would be best to get it out of the way early and before lambing.

As last year we have had to use a lot of straw for bedding and had to buy in another load this week. The resulting composting and use of BD preparations adds value to our soils, but it must not be forgotten that it is at the expense of other pieces of land.

No date has been settled for scanning the ewes but contact has been established, and they somehow have clean fleeces. The same cannot be said of the lambs, though despite their dirty fleeces they seem to be holding their condition-indeed the last batch that went may have been a little light but all but one were gradeR3L.

Efforts to reduce the 'lake' on field 6 having failed we are hiring a machine to insert land drains which can generate a force of 3000 pounds per square inch, and drive itself forward. If that fails to solve the problem, we shall have no option than to lay a new land drain running into the river. The 'Lake' in field 5k is of less concern since it was created under the HSL scheme though

it has never before held water for such a long period.

It is now 14 years since we took over the farm and I have written to the Board of the Society summarising these past years and indicating that the time has come for the Society, as our landlords, to support us with some capital investment. With the obvious climatic changes that are taking place we need to be able to house all our stock at the same time. We also need limited financial support for the refencing of the farm. Such investments obviously add value and enable any

tenancy to remain viable whatever the future may hold.

We do of course face a new threat other than Brexit. Veganism has been held by the courts to be a philosophical belief and so subject to protection. Add to that the attack on eating meat and the threat worsens. There seems to be no understanding that intensive meat production poses a totally different threat from that raised on organic farms, and as we saw over Brexit, if the media 'Gangs up' on a view, they have enormous influence.



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News from Stock & Bradley Parish Council

Speed Checks in Stock & Bradley

Two checks were carried out in January by PC Warren Edmunds one in Bradley Green on Friday 10th January and the second in Stock Green on Wednesday 15th January.

PC Edmunds monitored 100 cars in an hour in Bradley Green and 57 in Stock Green which would suggest that almost 50% of the cars going through Bradley Green are coming from the Inkberrow direction.

PC Edmonds was very impressed by the VAS as it recorded exactly the same speed as his speed gun and commented that he believed that it was "a major contributor in reducing the overall speeding through the village" and was the "most advanced he had seen".

The Parish Councillors would like to thank PC Edmunds for making Stock & Bradley a regular village for his speed checks.

Second VAS to be installed in Stock & Bradley

The Parish Council are now in the process of ordering a second VAS for the village, this means that Stock & Bradley will each have a VAS permanently situated in their 30 mph area; we are also ordering two more posts which will enable the VAS's to be moved to different to positions as well, as we were informed this also helps reduce speeding.
