

We're delighted Bloor Homes proposal is off!

In response to today's statement from Malvern Hills District Council regarding the withdrawal of Bloor Homes planning application, the Save Elgar's Village action group had this to say:

"We're delighted that Bloor Homes has withdrawn its totally inappropriate, poorly thought out and entirely speculative planning application" says Paul Swinburn, Chairman of SaEV. "It's a victory for common sense and people power."

The application was to build nearly 4,000 houses – equivalent to a town larger than Pershore – on green fields in the strategic gap between Lower Broadheath and Worcester. The Save Elgar's Village action group, with some 600 members from around the region has campaigned tirelessly against it since 2009.

"Pleased as we are with this news, we're also angry at the waste of resources and taxpayers money that this unwanted proposal from Bloor has meant. The widespread consultations undertaken by Malvern Hills District Council showed an almost unanimous rejection of Bloor's ideas. Let's hope in future that developers consult local residents before – rather than after – putting forward their plans and that the new Localism Bill will pave the way for this. We want new homes for families but the numbers must be proportionate to the size of our village. Building massive housing estates is unnecessary and is no longer the right approach," continued Paul.

Candidates for the District Council Elections

SaEV Chairman Paul Swinburn and Deputy Chairman Roger Bass have both recently been adopted as the two Conservative candidates for the ward of Lower Broadheath to stand in the elections for Malvern Hills District Council on 5th May. Says Paul, "The battles over housing transport and infrastructure are only just beginning. Roger and I have been persuaded to stand to give Lower Broadheath, Rushwick and Broadwas a stronger voice at Malvern Hills." and Roger adds "Under the coalition government's new localism structures it is vital that local opinions are both well formulated and heard."

BROADHEATH PRIMARY SCHOOL

Hello and Happy New Year from everyone at Broadheath School. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the staff, confidently led by Mr Andy Hackley, during the autumn term and for the community support given to the school during its transition phase from one Head Teacher to another. Thank you for the warm welcome I have received from the Governing body, chaired by Mrs Barbara Beard. We would also like to express our appreciation of Mr Adam Birchell for his services to the school as a Governor over recent years, adults and children alike have benefited from his contributions.

The end of term was extremely busy and ended on a high. The school Nativity and Carol Services were very well attended, a big thank you to everyone who joined us to celebrate this joyous festival. Prior to this, the whole school visited the Swan Theatre in Worcester to see Cinderella, we had some flattering reports on the excellent behaviour of our children - they were great ambassadors for the school and we should all be proud of them.

This term there are a variety of themes being explored by the children throughout the school: 'Cool Stuff', Megastructures, Trees and Woods. This week Class 5 embarked upon an enterprise project around gardening and over time will be supporting children in other classes as the project expands. Last week, to gain the initial stimuli, Class 5 and Class 4 went to the Herbert Museum and Art Gallery in Coventry to be immersed in different art forms and participate in street art workshops. A group of pupils from Class 5 are also working on a joint maths trail project with neighbouring schools, this will culminate in a maths trail morning at the Cobb House to which families will be invited whilst maths trails will be set up in school for our remaining pupils to experience back in school. We are also looking forward a trip to the Alexandra Theatre in Birmingham with our Key Stage 2 pupils in addition to inviting a puppeteer in to perform and run workshops with the children in Classes 1 and 2.

We have already welcomed visitors from the 'Open the Book' team supporting our assembly programme. Worcester Warriors (rugby), Worcester Wolves (basket ball) staff and tennis coaches have also joined us to work with classes and run after school activities with our children. We are looking forward to working even more closely with members of the Broadheath community as we embrace future opportunities and challenges.

Consequently, the removal of both trees was the only option.

This is one example of how the money we raise is spent. We rely greatly on subscriptions from members of the Friends of Christ Church, which still remains at £10 per person or £15 for rtwo family members per annum.
