

Shared Ownership Homes Wembley Cottage, Bell Lane.

Readers will be aware that the 'shared ownership homes' provided as part of this development are now complete and I believe look very attractive. We are told by Festival Housing that two properties have been allocated but one home is still available. The house is priced at £75,000 for a 50% share and a rental of £42.69/ week plus a small service charge of £4.99 payable over 48 weeks. PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Elections: Once again there will not be an election for the Parish Council. This is because there were only seven nominations for eleven vacancies. In a village of the size of Lower Broadheath this is a sad reflection on the interest shown in local affairs. At our first meeting on May 16th we will be co-opting members to fill the four vacancies.

Public Rights of Way: We are fortunate in this country that a network of footpaths is available to give access to the countryside for all. This is not the case in most countries. The Rights of way are way-marked and open to all – but a right of way across a field DOES NOT give walkers the right to deviate from the footpath and walk all over the farmer's land. The regulations are clear, walkers must keep to the footpath and dogs kept under reasonable control. The Parish Council and the Police have had cases reported to them of dog-walkers walking well away from the official footpath and allowing dogs to run wild, not surprisingly the farmer in question objects to this. We have the right to walk the footpaths but with that right comes the responsibility to respect the rights of the landowner.

More for dog owners: There have also been cases of dog-owners clearing up after their animals and then just dumping the bags of dog-mess in the hedges or throwing them into fields. Plastic bags take years to break down and not only remain an eyesore and a danger to wild-life, but could be fatal to cattle and horses who might ingest one. When you clean up after your dog, please take it home and dispose of it properly or use the bins provided around the village.

Future initiatives: Maybe there is life in Lower Broadheath after all! Plans are afoot to start a Short-mat Bowls Club and a Youth Club, both involving use of the Village Hall, (and the Bell for the short mat bowls.) The Village Hub, based in the Church should also be open by mid-summer. (see page 11 for more). Well done to all who are involved in setting up these initiatives – perhaps our community spirit is not dead after all.

Finally, a reminder that the Police can only take action on complaints of anti-social behaviour etc. if the person witnessing the act is willing to make a statement.

BROADHEATH PRIMARY SCHOOL

We hope you all had an enjoyable Easter. We ended the term with an Easter celebration in the Church during which the children sang a medley of Easter hymns interspersed with a passion playlet led by our Yr 3, 4 and 5 pupils and ending with Easter prayers written by Class 4 pupils.

Leading up to Easter pupils from Reception, Yr1 & 2 and children from the village preschool enjoyed a visit by a puppeteer, sharing a story called 'The Fox's Tale' followed by practical workshops. Meanwhile, our older pupils visited the Alexandra theatre to watch Georges Marvelous Medicine as part of their Healthy Week activities. In addition we focussed on fitness and healthy lifestyle choices, personal hygiene, germs and viruses. We also held a Geography Day basing work on the local environment and mans impact on the wider world, this culminated in a Collective Worship celebration which was very well attended by parents. We celebrated National Book Day in style – several staff arrived dressed as 'the Mister Men' whilst pupils wore costumes demonstrating a wide range of literary heroes. Our maths trail project culminated in a successful celebration morning at the Cobb House, where Yr 5 pupils encouraged their parents to participate in maths trails that they had devised using the outdoor learning space. Class 3 finished the term with a healthy focus inviting parents to join them for a 'healthy picnic' which was also very well received.

We are very proud of our sporting achievements this term. Our Yr 4 children played football against pupils from Our Lady Queen of Peace Primary school which resulted in a draw then our under 11's secured a 3-2 win against Hallow Primary School and a 2-1 win against Great Witley. We have played in several tournaments coming 6 out of 10 teams in netball and getting to the Under 8's semi-final at The Grange, only just losing out to Kempsey by one goal.

We have been very busy fund raising this term: a mini project to support the World Wildlife Fund raising money for pandas reached a total of £56.00, whilst our Grand total for Red Nose Day exploits was £372.00. a big thank you to everyone who supported us. Four of our children: Callum, Emma Kate and Gabby were superb ambassadors for the school when we were invited to the D&T Eggstravaganza challenge St. Mary's School. Several of our pupils took part in the Spring Garden show, well done to Charlie, Max and Oliver for gaining a first with their spring garden and Ellie and Harvey for gaining highly recommended in recognition of their hard work.

We have had several visitors this term including Jan from the Fire Service, Open the Book and Justin from Worcester Wolves basketball team. Our most memorable visit was when Class 2 went to see the new pedestrian bridge between the Diglis Basin and Lower Wick (as part of their Megastructures theme), met the Mayor there and went back to the Guildhall with him for a tour and a bite to eat.

It is with sadness that we will be saying good bye to Mrs Suttie who has worked with the school for several years and brought lots of joy and laughter to the pupils and staff, we wish her well in her new venture.

We are conducting a feasibility study to gauge child care needs in the village with the possibility of providing a wrap around service. We have enclosed a covering letter and questionnaire with this newsletter and would be grateful if you could spend a few minutes completing it and returning it to school by Friday 20th May 2011, thank you for your co-operation. Drama

Street Dance, for girls and boys, was launched in February. Professional dancers provided the instruction and all participants had loads of fun.

Badminton Club, for years 7 and 8 students, commenced in March as an after school activity.

The **District Cross Country Championship** saw seven girls in the junior category qualify for the County Race at Hereford in February.

Library Learning Centre

Read International, a charity that collects and distributes books to Tanzania, is coming to the Chantry to promote the work that it does. The school has supported this charity for some time and currently there are 25 boxes of books awaiting collection from the school.

Enterprise Challenge

A team of year 9 pupils has been selected to represent The Chantry at MAZAK Enterprises. Chantry pupils will compete against teams from Herefordshire and Worcestershire in the form of meeting deadlines, co-operation and leadership skills.

Hereford Bus

Hereford Sixth Form College has confirmed that quotations have been received for the provision of a bus service between Martley (calling at Great Witley) and the Sixth Form College from the start of the next academic year.

Chantry Geology Conservation Area Project

The Geology Conservation area is taking shape and will be included in the Martley Geology trail that takes in the local Geology on a seven-mile walk around the village. Volunteers are being sought to level viewing areas, plug holes and erect interpretation boards.

UPDATE ON THE 'VILLAGE HUB'

The hard work and perseverance involved in applying for grant funding has been rewarded!

We have been awarded grants from two bodies -

Worcestershire LEADER & Severn Waste





The funding from these grants will pay for half of the amount required for both the building works and the fittings for the 'Hub'. The remaining monies have been provided by our fundraising events, (which include last Village Appeal and at the two 'Shindig' shows), together with a substantial amount of 'rainy-day' money from our church funds. This is a community project for the benefit of Lower Broadheath and is funded as such.

At the moment we are finalising various contracts and the permissions needed before the building work starts. These permissions have been agreed and now just need completing. The main building works consist of construction of an adaptable toilet and a kitchenette. We had hoped to be able to start work in May, but now June appears to be more realistic and we are told that it will take around 6 weeks to complete.

This Village Hub will be open free to the public 5 days a week ,for approximately 7 hours a day. It is planned to provide non-alcoholic drinks , a café style layout , a mini-Library (supported by Malvern Library service), and an Information board etc..

In addition, an upstairs Meeting room will be available to local organisations for their use, during and after Hub opening hours.

We need Volunteers to act as hosts/hostesses to man the Hub. Please let us know if you can spare one half day (or more) on a regular basis

Members had very much enjoyed their visit to the Swan Theatre to see Great Witley Operatic Society's performance of the Gondoliers.

We continue to be entertained by excellent speakers on varied topics.

In February Sandy Cale, an official guide for Worcester Walking Tours, dressed in a white gown and bonnet of the period, gave a memorable and fascinating talk on Georgian Worcester. This was enhanced by lovely slides shown by her husband. We were inspired to be more observant of our remaining heritage of beautiful buildings and to be proud of the most prominent and renowned Guildhall.

Another special talk by Mr R Hurcomb entitled 'A Man Worth his Salt' was the enthralling life story of John Corbett. Although connected to French aristocracy, he rose from a more modest family background in England, to great wealth and prominence as a benefactor and philanthropist. He was mainly responsible for the development of Droitwich into a thriving Spa town which began with building better houses for his salt workers. After this, he created the Chateau Impney, which took 7 years to build, for his wife, from whom he later became sadly estranged. He also converted mansions he owned into the Raven Hotel (named after his ancestral crest of ravens). The former Worcestershire Hotel and the Brine Baths complex.

The latest speaker, Dr M Mylechreest informed us of the various tTustees, Sponsors, Management and future of Gardens in Trust and gave a very interesting narration to a continuous projection of beautiful slides.

GARDENING SOCIETY

I wish I could say it was because I had to be away on the Monday evening of the Annual Quiz between the Society and the W.I. that accounted for yet another defeat for us by that group of intrepid ladies. How do they manage to master the art of in-

stant recall so readily? It must be a gender thing! Enough excuses: congratulations to the W. I. for yet another win and a warning: I shall be back next year! The March meeting featured the usual Daffodil Competition. The joint winners of the Carwood Cup were Terry and Jill Witherall whose splendid blooms managed to outshine the other 17 competitors. The overall standard, as commented upon by our specialist speaker, was very high. Vic Aspland gave a fascinating talk on "Bulbs Through the Year". I became a little uneasy when after 35 minutes he had still only reached the month of March, but need not have worried; there are fewer bulbs for the summer and autumn than there are for spring! There were some wonderful slides and excellent advice. For example: always try and procure bulbs that have just been lifted and can be transplanted whilst still damp. Dry bulbs do not do as well, and yet we are all used to buying bulbs when they are dry! (This is particularly true of snowdrops which should not be planted when dry but when they are in leaf i.e. now!)

The big excitement was the Spring Show. Masterminded by John Steel as a new venture for the Society, there was some trepidation about the possible interest that would be generated. We need not have worried. Given that this was an experiment, it was very well supported and the perfume from the spring flowers which greeted one on entry to the Hall was an experience not to be missed. The afternoon was made all the more rewarding because of the really fabulous afternoon teas provided by the ladies from the church.
