PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

There was a briefing from P R Consultants on behalf of Lioncourt Homes (LCH) who are seeking to promote

120/130 New homes between Claphill Lane and the A4440.

Lioncourt are based in Worcester, have been trading for five years and build in the region of 300 houses per year.

It was explained that LCH were responding to Malvern Hills District Council's request for new sites in the current SWDP Review process and MHDC 5 year rolling land supply programme for house building. Further that they had an agreement with the land owner to promote he site for house building, which they hoped would be included within the SWDP Review or could go forward as a speculative application.

LCH would like Rushwick Parishioners to be involved as to what they would expect from the build and any feedback would be appreciated, to see if it could be incorporated within the plan; e.g. house styles/design and types, community green space and play provision, commercial units, start up offices, live/work units.

With regard to infrastructure, they would look to see if a better bus service could be put in place and maybe a new Doctor's Surgery.

They reiterated that the site will have little impact on the village as it will be partly hidden behind the Whitehall Public House, sits down in a low area and with the entrance to the site being situated along Claphill Lane is not on main route through the village.

There will be a formal Public Consultation on the 8th February 2019 in the Village Hall where they hope to gather feedback about their proposals.

Parishioners Questions

Most were worried about this large amount of extra homes being built in the village.

The general consensus of opinion reflected that;-

The Village has had more than its fair share of new homes built within it's environs already.

Was there really a need for more as sites within the Village as current developers seemed to be having difficulty selling the new homes already built.

This issue would be exacerbated when considering 900 new homes to be built in West Worcester Development Area.

Other points raised were:

Potential drainage problems with the site affecting houses on Bransford Road

Claphill Lane is very narrow giving rise to road safety issues for pedestrians, cyclists and vehicle users General infrastructure issues;

Dangerous junction at end of Claphill Lane with Hereford Road

Increased traffic on the bypass

Greater congestion than on all routes

Poor bus services

No cycle lanes

No footpaths

The overall feeling was that the New Build is not wanted and is not necessary.

The Parish Council will Display information regarding this potential build before the Lioncourt Consultation so they will have their questions/queries ready. (Info to be provided by LCH) Standing orders were reimposed.

OPEN FOR BUSINESS

As part of the Council's Town and City improvements programme, The Shambles and Church Street in Worcester are set for a makeover. The scheme is being delivered in partnership with Worcester City Council who are jointly funding the project. Included in the scheme are plans to widen footpaths, introduce segregated loading bays, remove obstructions, plant street trees and carry out other updates to improve the overall look and feel of the two streets.
