Dear All,



There's a phrase that seems to be used in common parlance these days that I find strange. Very often you'll hear someone saying that something is "quite unique" which seems an odd way to use a superlative. Either something is unique or it's not – it's almost like saying "slightly pregnant" which clearly would make no sense. I suspect it's because in life there are not too many things which are unique so things that are infrequent become "quite unique". Using this presumption, I can't say that I've experienced too many things which were unique but West Berlin was one of them. In the middle 1980's Kerry spent her year out from University working there so I visited as often as possible. I can safely say that it was a unique experience.

If you flew to West Berlin there were only certain air corridors that could be used. There was nothing special about this, it is how all air travel works, but in West Berlin's case the plane had to slow down and fly at a relatively low altitude (10-12,000ft). If you travelled by train, the doors would be locked at the first station in East Germany and then unlocked again at the last station. If you drove there, there were certain transit corridors which often had "false speed limits" which the East Germans ignored but if you were from the West had to be obeyed as there were potentially unlimited fines. The lowest one I saw was near Magdeburg when it was dropped to 10 km/h – I could have run quicker but you were advised not to get out of your car anywhere in the East!

The thing that I noticed the most though was crossing the border into East Berlin and simply walking around. We tended to take the S-bahn to Friedrichstraße which put you straight in the centre of East Berlin. On one occasion I was wearing yellow espadrilles (it was summer and they were fashionable at the time) and everyone kept looking at my shoes. Given that they only cost a couple of Deutschmarks it was surprising until you realised that there was very little colour in the East and these shoes stood out. We walked a little way from the station to Alexanderplatz and went up the Fernsehtürm (the television tower) as it had a restaurant at the top that slowly revolved round. And as we looked out enjoying our mushrooms (there was nothing else on the menu that day) it was obvious that there was simply a lack of colour everywhere – it was quite saddening. On returning to the West, colours were vibrant again – it was an amazing juxtaposition.

At Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and filled their lives beyond measure – bringing life in its fullness – filling their lives with true colour if you like. When we accept Jesus, we accept the Holy Spirit as well and our lives can be vibrant. We need to embrace this with all our beings as it's a unique gift from God. And if this new found, or newly re-discovered joy, makes you want to buy a pair of Espadrilles, they're available at M & S from £22 (which is some inflation!) but I'm afraid it looks like yellow ones were purely an 80's thing!



I have realised that I have been a bit remiss in not keeping you updated with the progress of my Atlantic rowing challenge later this year. So here goes...

The first bit of big news is that we have managed to buy our boat! We held a large fundraising event in Worcester at the end of last year and with the proceeds, together with some badly needed sponsorship, were able to procure Pegasus – our 23 foot rowing boat. She arrived back into the UK last month (from crossing the Atlantic in December 2022) and I am pleased to report that she is now safely in Chichester harbour from where my colleague Matt and I have started to become acquainted with her. A few facts about the boat

• There is a cabin at each end – so my partner and I aren't cheek by jowl 24 hours a day: this will primarily be our sleeping quarters.

• It has a parachute anchor which acts like a parachute in the sea if we need to deploy it. This is really useful as if the wind is blowing the wrong way it will stop us being blown backwards quite so much, which would undo all our hard earned progress.

• It has an autopilot to keep us on the right heading, as well as hand and foot steering.

There are four rowing gates which means both Matt and I can row together, although realistically one of us will be resting while the other is rowing as our two hours on, two hours off routine, 24 hours a days means we will want to rest as much as possible.

Post arrival of the boat the first weekend we spent hours sorting out the equipment and getting to look in every nook and cranny – not that there are many of those. We have to spend 120 hours on the water before December to qualify for the race so with that in mind we spent our first visit down in Chichester cosely acquainting ourselves with her to the extent of sleeping in the cabins on the boat... albeit on the trailer! The next day we put it in the water at Itchenor, it is a remarkably gentle slipway and all went smoothly until we realised we had forgotten to take the electric board off the trailer before backing her in. Oops, but all a learning experience.

Since then we have been out on the water for three consecutive weekends and on one of those weekends we over-nighted on the boat in the middle of Chichester estuary. An interesting experience where it is very important that you understand the tidal range as otherwise you could ground or alternatively pull your anchor and drift. We almost did both but managed to rescue the situation with 2am and 5.30am rowing to reposition ourselves and make sure everything was OK. On the plus side I'm not sure we are going to be using the anchor too much in the Middle of the Atlantic!

Cooking on the boat is going to be interesting. This will only be outside for safety reasons and will solely consist of one small gas canister with one ring on which we will boil whatever is needed. Our water requirements will be met by a water-maker which will take sea water and purify it into drinking water. This is one of the most important pieces of equipment for obvious reasons and will be powered by two batteries which in turn are powered by a solar panel on each cabin. We really don't want this to break as otherwise after our personal stint of two hours rowing we would have to manually operate a pump to make water – 20 minutes of continuous pumpina will make one litre of water, when our arms will already be tired and we will just want to go to bed.

Having had a fantastic start to our campaign, we are still badly in need of sponsorship and if anybody is reading this who thinks their Company may be able or willing to help, in return for branding and more – get in touch! Everything raised will be going to Acorns Children's Hospice which is the most fantastic cause we could wish to do something so stupid for. Thanks!

We were reminded to book as soon as possible for our outing to Selly Manor in June.


Also, menus were available for the AGM lunch in July. The price will be £27 to cover an excellent buffet, glasses of wine, hire of hall, table decorations etc.




